To be held at the International Convention Centre, Durban, South Africa.

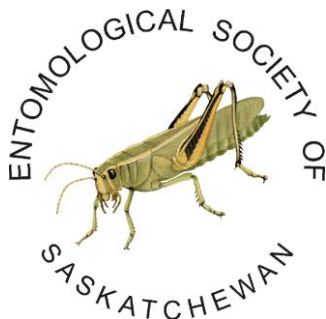
